On this 17<sup>th</sup> day of September 1832  
personally appeared in open Court before the Secretary of  
Bullitt County New Station, Lawrence Bishop a  
Resident of Bullitt County in the State of Kentucky  
aged Sixty Nine years who being first duly  
sworn according to Law "doth on his Oath make  
the following Declaration in order to obtain the  
benefit of the act of Congress passed during the  
1832 that he entered the service of the United  
States under the following named Officers and  
Served as follows: In the year 1780. The  
Year of the Metadam of Bedford County State of  
Pennsylvania being called on to do military  
duty on the Frontiers of Pennsylvania to defend  
against the incursions of the Indians a  
Draft was made and he entered the Company  
Commanded by Captain Harry Bush (The Com-  
mander and Friends of said Company not now  
recalled) as a Substitute for his father  
George Bishop who had been drafted for a term  
of Two Months he marched to the Town of  
Bedford in said County distant about Fifty  
miles from his residence and he with three  
others were detailed stations at that  
place as a Guard by order of Col. Woody  
of the Bedford County Militia. Capt. Bush  
and the balance of the Company were stationed  
about Nine Miles from Bedford on the Head  
Waters of the Limestone River. After having  
scared the deer of deer by spreading of  
aforeaid he was discharged by Capt. Bush at  
Bedford aforesaid & returned home. There were  
no Regular Officers or Soldiers Stationed where  
he was. Capt. Bush gave him a discharge in  
writing which he has lost or destroyed. In  
the year 1781 ~ the Metadam of said Bedford

County was again called on to guard against the Indians in the Mountains and a draft took place and the said Lawrence Bishop entered the Company Commanded by Captain Thomas Slavy as a Substitute for Adam Smith who had been drafted for a term of two months and in the month of May of said year he was marched to said town of Bedford, a distance of about thirty miles from his residence. From Bedford he was marched about twenty five miles to the frontier and stationed at Capt. Thomas Pines to guard the Inhabitants and during said term he was marched across the Alleghany Mountains and was constantly engaged in guarding the country. At the expiration of the term he was discharged at said Pines by Capt. Thomas Slavy and he returned home. His discharge was in writing but he has lost or destroyed it. There were no regular officers or soldiers where he resided and he does not know who the Lieutenant & Ensign of the Company to which he belonged were as they were stationed at other places and he was under the Captain's command. In the month of August in the year last mentioned took up 17th the militia of said County was again called on and a draft took place and in the month of August he entered the service of the Company Commanded by Captain George Salter as a Substitute for John Milburn who had been drafted for a term of duty for two months. He was marched to the said town of Bedford and from thence about eight miles to Vee Carby's fort where he stayed with a short time. The Indians having broken in & killed a family there being at the camping of Indians River about fifteen miles from Vee Carby fort, he and the Company were marched to H. S. L. and remained for a while at P. C. Co. January - from thence he was marched to Abram's Mailing - from thence he was marched to Cowpatty further down the same all winter where he stayed until his term expired when he returned to P. C. Mailing and was discharged by

Captain George Slocum and Alvin L. Hovey - He  
received a discharge signed by Capt. Ichabod Bush they  
lost or destroyed it - I hereby relinquish my claim  
whatever to a pension or annuity except the present  
and declare that my name is not on the Pension  
Roll of the army of any State. And that I cannot  
prove my service by any person except by Henry  
Sawyer and David Shires. The affidavit of said  
Sawyer is hereto attached.

Interrogatory proposed by the Court. Answer and in  
what year were you born? Answer I was born in  
Bedford County State of Pennsylvania on the 12<sup>th</sup> day of  
May 1763. Have you any record of your  
age and if so where is it? Answer I had a record  
of my age but what became of it I know not.  
When have been blind about twelve years.  
Where were you living when called into service  
where have you lived since the Revolutionary War  
and where do you now live? Answer I was living  
in Bethel Township, Bedford County, Pennsylvania  
when called into service and I served there until  
the 28<sup>th</sup> day of October 1793 when I left there  
for the territory settled in Jefferson County where I  
lived some years removed to Butler County where  
I now reside. How soon you called into service  
were you drafted, and you volunteer or were you  
a Substituted and if a Substitute for whom?

Answer In my first term of two months I served  
as a Substitute for my father George Bishop. In  
the second term of two months I served as a Substi-  
tute for Adam Smith and in the last term of  
two months I served as a Substitute for John  
McKee. State the names of some of the Regular  
Officers who were with the Troops where you served  
such Continental and militia Regiments as you can  
recollect and the general Circumstances of your  
service. Answer There were no regular Officers when  
I served. There were no Continental or militia -  
Regiment. The militia was called out by Companies  
and stationed at the different posts on the frontier  
for the protection of the Indians - My service

consists in guarding the frontier from the  
encroaching and depredatory of the Indians.  
And you ever receive a discharge from the Service  
and if so by whom was it signed and what has  
become of it. Answer For the first Town of  
duty I received a Discharge from my Capt.  
Henry Rush. For the second Town from Capt.  
Thomy Slavy and for the Third from Capt.  
George Estey. I do not now know what they  
became of them or State the Name of Major  
to whom you are known in your present  
neighborhood and who can testify as to your  
Character for honesty and good behavior &  
your Service as a Soldier. Answer I am  
known to Austin Hall, Joseph Fairweather, Henry  
Cox, Capt Richard P. Simeon - they can testify  
as to my character for honesty & good behavior  
Honesty Testimony as to my Services. There is no  
Chapman residing in my neighborhood  
and I am not able to go where I could procure  
Procure the Certificate of one.

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter relative to  
one Lawrence Bishop, a soldier of the Revolutionary  
War.

The data contained herein are obtained from  
the papers on file in the Revolutionary War claim  
for pension, S.1166, based upon his military service  
in that war.

Lawrence Bishop, son of George Bishop, was born  
May 13, 1763 in Bedford County, Pennsylvania.

While a resident of Bethel Township, Bedford  
County, Pennsylvania, he entered the service in  
May 1780 as a substitute for his father, George Bishop,  
in Captain Henry Rush's Company and was stationed for  
two months at the town of Bedford as a guard by order  
of Colonel Woods of the Bedford County Militia. He  
entered the service in May 1781, served two months in  
Captain Thomas Davy's Pennsylvania Company and guarded  
the frontiers. He entered the service in August 1781  
and served a tour of two months in Captain George  
Inlows' Pennsylvania Company.

In 1793 soldier moved from Bethel Township,  
Bedford County, Pennsylvania to Jefferson County,  
Kentucky and some years later moved to Bullitt County,  
Kentucky.

He was allowed pension on his application exe-  
cuted September 17, 1832 while a resident of Bullitt  
County, Kentucky.

No statement is made as to the marriage of  
soldier. There are no further family data, except  
the above reference to his father.
