John Rengard a pensioner of the United States by application
dated the 21st of July 1819 at eight dollars per month Comed
personally into the Court being a County of Nelson and
delivered a Schedule of his estate value the sum named
at \$125.33 $\frac{1}{3}$ forty one to make the said Pension
due agreeably to the Law. Wherefore it is ordered that
the said Schedule and Schedules be Recorded and Certified
to him. On the 20th day of February 1824 personally
appeared in open Court being a Court of Record for the
Chancery Judicial District of Kentucky by the Commissioner
Law Officer of the State John Rengard aged
forty four years residing in Bell County being
first produced according to law doth on his oath declare
that he served in the Revolutionary War as soldier. He
enlisted in Captain Andrew Maypony's Company 12th Virginia
Regiment Commanded by Col. John Strick in August 1776
left from Pittsburg he marched to Fort Pitt and
from thence he marched again to Pittsburg, from thence
to Winchester and thence to Philadelphia and joined the
Main Army Commanded by General Washington and then
marched to Brandywine where he was in the engagement
of the 11th of September 1777 Called the Battle of
Brandywine, from thence he marched to the Pacific and
was in the battle or massacre at the Pacific Commanded by
Genl. Wayne and then he marched to Germantown
where he was in the Battle of Germantown and continued
in the service until the 10th day of April 1778 when he
was discharged - The number of his Pension is 14177 and
the date of his original application is the 21st day of
July 1819. And I do solemnly swear that I was a Resident
Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818
and that I have not since that time by gift, sale or in
any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof
with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself
within the provisions of an act of Congress entitled and

An Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land
travel service of the United States, passed on the 18th day
of March 1818. And that I have now nor by any one in
trust for me any property or security, Contingent or otherwise,
due me nor have I any income other than what is
contained in the schedule hereto annexed and subscribed
by me to wit, 11 Horses 11 years old - 1 Colt 10 years
old. 1 Colt 6 years old - two Cows and one Calf
one Heifer, One yearling Calf. One sow & pig - 1 Head
of Sheep. One Barbado Plough & one pair of Gees
One pair of axe and mallets. One Common Deck
Cupboard and two Wedding rings.

The declarant is by occupation a farmer. He has
lost the sight of his right eye and is very much reduced
in strength. His wife is aged fifty four years, her health
is not good - He has living with him two children, the
eldest a daughter aged 22 years, yet single, the other
a son named Philip aged 16 years, and has been a cipher
from his birth by not having the use of his right
Arm and right leg and is of unsound mind, proven so
and declared before 20th of February 1821.



Declaration of Solemnity



DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA, ss.

On this 27th day of July 1819 before me, the subscriber, one of the Judges of the Circuit Court of the State of New York for the said district, personally appeared John Bryan aged 62 years, resident in Jefferson County in the said district, who, being by me first duly sworn, according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain the provision made by the late act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war:" That he, the said Bryan, enlisted for the term of eighteen months on the 10th day of October in the year 1776 in the company commanded by Captain Andrew Waggoner of the Regiment commanded by Colonel John Neville in the line of the State of Virginia on the Continental Establishment; that he continued to serve in the said corps, or in the service of the United States, until the 10th April 1778, when he was discharged from service in Valley Forge state of Pennsylvania, that he was in the battles of

and that he is in reduced circumstances, and stands in need of the assistance of his country for support; and that he has no other evidence now in his power of his said services.

Swear to and declared before me the day and year aforesaid.

I, John P. O'Leary, Judge, &c. as aforesaid, do certify that it appears, to my satisfaction, that the said John Bryan did serve in the revolutionary war, as stated in the preceding declaration, against the common enemy, for the term of nine months at one time, on the continental establishment; and I now transmit the proceedings and testimony taken and had before me, to the Secretary for the Department of War, pursuant to the directions of the aforementioned act of Congress. I am also satisfied that he needs the assistance of his country for support.

also appeared before me Lewis Cooper
and made oath that he knew the said Bryan
in the service & saw him at Fort Pitt in April 1777
in Capt Maggones company and saw him again in
November 1777 at Whittemore - that he was present
a neighbor with the s^t Bryan and has no doubt
his full service for eighteen months - witness
the 21st fiscal day of July 1819 -
