On this 19th day of August 1833
personally appeared in open Court before the Justice
of the County Court of Bullitt County in the State of
Kentucky now setting William Chappell,
aged twenty two years on the 18th day of October
1812, a Resident of Bullitt County, State of Kentucky
who being first duly sworn according to Law
doth on his Oath make the following Declaration
in order to obtain the Benefits of the Act of
Congress passed June 7th 1832. That he entered
the Service of the United States under the
following named Officer and served as is
hereinafter set forth in the State
of Virginia in the fall of the year 1776 he was
drafted as a private in a Militia Company of
said County Commanded by Captain John Becker
for the Term of Three Months which Company
was a part of the Regiment Commanded by
Col^o Henry Rector and was then marched to
Savoy Town and then to Williamsburg in
said State of Virginia - The cause of the Militia
being Called on was this. The British Invasion
then appearing on the Coast and the Governor
and Council Called the militia into Service
for the protection of James, Town & Williams-
burg. after the Expiration of the Term aforesaid
he was discharged in Writing but he
does not now recollect who signed his
discharge. He does not recollect the day
or the month when he entered the Service
or the day or month when discharged
but he is positive of the length of his service
in Chesterfield County State of Virginia about
the last of February 1778, the day is not precisely

Reclected, he enlisted in the Army of the United States for one year in the Company commanded by Captain William Fowler in the 5th Regt. Ninth of the Virginia Line commanded by the
beloved Col^o Haskins our General Maculon.
being Brigades from Chesterfield County he
was marched to Valley forge at which place
he joined the Company. at that place he was
taken sick and very sick to Yellow Springs
Hospital where he lay sick two months.
During the time of his sickness the Regiment
and Brigade to which he belonged had
marched to Ticonderoga and Canada
Plains in the State of New York and so
soon as he recovered his health he joined
his Company Regiment Brigade at the
White Plains. From that place we marched
to West Point and were employed in
working on the Fort of炮 to proof until
the beginning of winter when we were
marched to Middle Brook in the Jersey.
and went into winter quarters. during the
part of the period of his service the Company to which
he belonged was commanded by Captain William
Reedley. He enlisted as a private and
erved as such about six months, he was then
appointed an orderly Sergeant and served as
such until he was discharged which was
on the last day of February or first of
March 1777 having served one year
having served one year he received a discharge
in writing but it has been lost or destroyed
He hereby certifies my claim whatever
be a pecuniary or annuity except the sum due
and he declareth that his name is not on
the Pension Roll of any agency in any state
to the last category prescribed by the War

3 Department and performed to him by the County
he making the following Answer.

To the 1st He answers that he was born in
Chestfield County State of Virginia on the
18th day of October 1760

To the 2^d He answers that there is a record of his
age in Chestfield County State of Virginia
in the Church where he was Christened.

To the 3^d He answers that he was living in
Chestfield County, Virginia, when called into
Service. He lived there some years after the
Revolutionary War, then moved to Kentucky
and he now lives in Bell County State of
Kentucky.

To the 4th He answers that for the first term of
duty of three months he was drafted or a
private. For his second Service of one year
he enlisted ~~Recruited~~ as is before stated.

To the 5th He answers that he recollects now
only the names of Col^o Miles Botts & his Capt^o
John Archer were with the Troops where he
served in 1776. He recollects Captain William
Howe, Captain William Bentley, Col^o Gaskins
& Gen^l George Lambing ~~for~~ he can not
recollect the different Regiments owing to the
length of time, his age & consequent loss of
Memory. The general Circumstances of his
Service has long already detailed.

To the 6th He says that he did receive a
discharge in writing for both Services but
he does not recollect who gave them.
They having been lost or destroyed many
years ago.

To the 7th He says that he is known to General P.
Morton, Lieu Wilson, Williams Rogers & John Rogers
of his present neighbourhood who can testify as
to his character for Integrity and their belief as to his
Service as a Soldier of the Revolution.

I John Chappell a Citizen of Bullitt County
in the State of Kentucky aged sixty four years
do certify that I do recollect that William
Chappell who has subscribed and sworn to
the foregoing Declaration was engaged in the
service of the United States during the Revolution
War. That he first went out thereof one
year but how long he does not now recollect
he afterwards went out for one year and said
but whether he went out both times as a
Drafted Volunteer or enlisted Soldier I do not
now recollect.

I now subscribe the day by me
aforsaid.

Department that the above named applicant
was a Revolutionary Soldier and Servant.

Bullitt County Kentucky Set

I Ruth Chappell of
said County aged from my best information
past 85 years do make this following

Statement (U.S.) I "I am the widow of
William Chappell who in his lifetime was
a Revolutionary Pensioner of the United
States under the Act of June 7th 1832

paid and payable at the Agency at
Lexington Kentucky, the rate of which
I do not now remember - The said
William Chappell was a resident of
this County; and in the fall of the
year went to Lexington Kentucky and
drew his money, and there took sick
and died at the residence of my brother

Laban Lexington — About two years
afterwards I went to Lexington to see
my friends and my brother Laban
went with me to the Pension Agency
and introduced me as the widow of
said William Chappell and I gave up
his Pension certificate and received
the arrears of his Pension that had
accrued from the date of his last drawing
until the day of his death the exact

date of which I then knew and as
I suppose proved by my brother —
I never had the record of his death
made in our Bible but we
have had occasion to look for
it heretofore but it has got destroyed
and my memory of late years
has failed me very much and
I must therefore refer to the
records of the Government even
for the year — Because I do not
know that my unassisted memory
could come even within two years
of it — But I think that it has been
at least twenty years — probably more
I was married to said William Chappell
in Bullitt County Kentucky in the fall
of the year nearly 40 years ago, by
Reverend Simeon Hall, and my name
before I was married to him was
Ruth Quirk

I have never married again since
the death of said William Chappell
but I am still his widow

I make this declaration for the
purpose of applying for and receiving
the benefit of the 3rd Section of the
Act of Congress of February 3d 1833

and any other acts or constructions of this act may
I have heretofore made are applicable
to my ~~estate~~^{or} Revision and Bounty Land
about three years ago - and sent
on afterwards some additional proof
Papers as I am informed by Mr
Samuels our County Court Clerk
were sent to a Mr S M Knight
of Washington City but I have
received no report since, and
Mr Samuels has sent me word
that he has heard nothing from
the Case.

I hereby with full power of sub
stitution appoint Jeff Buckley of
Louisville Kentucky my true and
lawful attorney for me and in my
name to prosecute said claim.

I once had a record of my marriage
to Mr Chappell but it is lost or
destroyed -

Bullitt County Kentucky Set

I Ruth Chappell of Bullitt County Kentucky aged
85 years do make this following statement
I am the widow of William Chappell
now deceased late of said County of Bullitt
who in his lifetime was a Revolutionary
Pensioner of the United States on the Agency
at Lexington Kentucky -

I was married to said William Chappell
in Bullitt County Kentucky about 40
years ago by Rev^e Simeon Hall and
my name before I was married was
Ruth Irick - The said William Chappell
died in Lexington Kentucky about
years ago leaving me his widow since
when I have never again married
but still remain his widow

I make this declaration for the
purpose of applying for and receiving
the benefit of the Bounty Land
Act of March 3rd 1855 & May 14 1856

I have never heretofore received
the benefits of these or any other
Bounty Land Act of Congress
I refer to the proof on which the
pension of said William Chappell was
granted as the best and in fact the

only proof known to me of his services
I have heretofore applied for Bounty
Land under Act 1853 - About three
years ago - through a Mr Knight of
Washington City - Papers prepared
by Robert F. Samuels - or on his
suggestion, and by him sent to said
Knight, and afterwards some
additional evidence, but Mr Samuels
Sends me word that he can get
no news from him

Of even date herewith I apply
for Revolutionary Pension under said
Section February 3rd 1853 etc, and for
fuller details and particulars I refer
to my statements made in said application

Dear Sir:

I advise you from the papers in the Revolutionary war pension claim, W.25410, it appears that William Chappell was born October 18, 1760, in Chesterfield County, Virginia.

While a resident of that county, he enlisted in the fall of 1776, and served three months as a private in Captain John Archer's Company in Colonel Miles Botts' Virginia Regiment. He enlisted late in February, 1778, and served one year as private and orderly sergeant in Captains William Fowler's and William Bentley's Companies in Colonel Gaskins' Virginia Regiment.

He married July 29, 1818, in Bullitt County, Kentucky, Ruth Quick.

He was allowed pension on his application executed August 19, 1833, at which time he was living in Bullitt County, Kentucky.

He died December 12, 1853, at Lexington, Kentucky, at the home of Iaban Headington, where his widow Ruth stated, was her brother.

On account of his services in the Revolution, his widow Ruth was allowed pension on her application executed May 27, 1853, at which time she was living in Bullitt County, Kentucky.

In 1869, she stated that she was ninety-six years of age and was a resident of Bullitt County, Kentucky, and her postoffice address was Pitts Point.
