On the 23^d day of July 1879 before
me the subscriber, a citizen of the above-mentioned
Court District, affixes his
hand, personally appeared William
Lamb Leomire aged fifty eight years resident in
the County of Butch, in the said District who being
by me first duly sworn, according to law, doth, make the
following declaration, in order to obtain the provisions
made by the late act of Congress, entitled "An act to
provide for certain persons engaged in the land and
seas service of the United States in the most recent
war" that he the said William Leomire
entered for the term of during the War on the
17th day of March 1781 in the County of Orange in
the State of New-York in the company commanded
by William Stevens of the Regiment
commanded by General John Lamb in the line
of the State of New-York being the Second Regiment
of Artillery, on the continental establishment.
that he continued to serve in the said Corps
or in the service of the United States until
the end of the War, when he was discharged
from service in Orange County at what point
in the State of New-York, that he was at in
the battle of York in Virginia at the taking
of Leesburg, & that he is in need
of circumstances, and states in the name of

the captain of his leavening for support; &
that he has no other mind in his power of
his said service, to swear to & declare before me,
the day & year aforesaid.

Also, personally appeared before me at
the same time, John left John Nelson
a citizen of Louisville and declared
upon his oath that the said William
Bonnwell did serve as a common
soldier in the revolutionary war
as stated in the preceding
declaration from the 4th of July
of 1781 until the end of the
war, given under
my hand & seal this 23rd
day of July 1819.

I, Jos P. Oldam Judge as af.
do certify that it appears
to my satisfaction that the
said William Bonnwell did
serve in the revolutionary
war as stated in the preceding
declaration against the common
enemy for the term of nine
months at one time on the
Continental Establishment.

State of Kentucky

On the 15th day of September 1870 personally appeared William Cornwall in the County Court of Jefferson County in the State aforesaid a Court created by the Constitution of the State and being a Court of record made so expressly by law, which keeps a record of its proceedings and also has power to fine and imprison; and the said Cornwall who is sixty years of age at this time and late a Farmer being first sworn according to law doth on his oath declare that he served in the Revolutionary war as follows: In the year 1779 he performed a tour of duty of two months as a following Guide under the immediate command of General Sinclair at the time Stony point was stormed - also in the year 1780 he performed a tour of duty of three months under the command of Colonel John Malcolm in the State of New-York in Captain McKen-
-tiss Company and with three other soldiers was detached and sent to Prospect Fort in the State of New-York at the time of Arnold's treason that he was discharged from Malcolm's Regi-
-ment and enlisted during the war in the Second New-York Artillery Regiment com-
-manded by Col. John Lamb and in Capt
-Wm Oliver's Company in which he served until the end of the said war making two
years and nine months service in the said
Lamb's Regiment - and that he served at the
siege

age of York when Cornwallis and his Army were
captured - And that for the said service a
pension has been granted the said Cornwallis
the Certificate for which is numbered 15177 -
The said formerly, alias Doctor Cornwall further
declares on oath that he was a resident
citizen of the United States on the 18th day of
March 1818 - that he has not since that time
by gift sale or in any manner disposed of
his property, or of any part thereof, with intent
thereby so to diminish it, as to bring himself
within the provisions of an act of Congress
entitled "An act to provide for certain persons
engaged in the Land and Naval Service of the
United States in the Revolutionary War" passed
on the 18th day of March 1818 - and that the said
Cornwall has not nor has any person for him
in trust, any property securities contracts or debts due
from or any income whatever his coarse and
insufficient wearing apparel excepted - The said
Cornwall also declares on oath that he is infirm
and unable to follow his late occupation of a
Farmer - that he has a daughter aged about
Twenty-three years, who is a Farm wife and main-
tains herself and another daughter aged about 21
years, who is a Farm Servt with whom he
lives and who are his only children and that the
the said formerly is a widower and has been
such about nineteen years -

Madam:

I advise you from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S. 35855, it appears that William Cornwall or Cornell, alias Dectus Cornwall, served in 1779 two months as a guide when Stony Point was stormed and in 1780, served three months in Captain McKinstry's Company, Colonel John Malcolm's New York Regiment. He enlisted in Orange County, New York, March 17, 1781, and served as a private in Captain William Stevens' Company, Colonel John Lamb's Regiment of Continental Artillery, was at the Siege of Yorktown and served two years & 9 mos.

He was allowed pension on his application executed July 23, 1819, at which time he was living in Bullitt County, Kentucky, aged about fifty-eight years.

In 1820, he was living in Jefferson County, Kentucky, and stated that he had been a widower for nineteen years (name of his wife not given), and referred to two daughters

aged about twenty-three years and twenty-one years, their names are not given. The names of soldier's parents are not stated, and there are no further data as to his family.
