Bell County, 3rd July 1853 / Person

On the fifteenth day of July 1853 before the Justice of
the Bell County Court was sitting, came
John Beck, a resident of Bell County in the
State of Kentucky, aged twenty years or thereabouts,
day of September 1832, who being first duly sworn
accusing to have done on his oath make the
following Declaration in order to obtain the
benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 7th
1832. That he entered the service of the
United States under the following named
Officer and served as ~~cross~~ ^{as appropriate} Stationed in Hardy
County State of Virginia in the month of
April, as well as he now recollects, in the year
1781 he was drafted and placed in the Office
Company of Militia commanded by Captain
Michael Stamps, a man named Michael
Hornbeck & Elizur James Toff and another
to Richmond Virginia said Company was
then attached to a Company of Light Horse
Commanded as well as he recollects by a Captain
White & a Company under a Captain of Light
Infantry Regular Soldier Commanded by a
Captain Captain, the three Companies were
Commanded by a Major. His officers according
to the best of his recollection. He was placed
in front of the American Army commanded
by Major General La Fayette as a Front
Guard and his duty was to guard & Recom-
mend the British Army was at that time
in Virginia & marching down to York-
town and we were almost constantly engaged
and during said army service when the Ameri-
can Army was pursuing the British

General Monk being placed by Major General
Gage Command and observed that we should
soon have something to do, at that time we
were about Three miles in advance of the
American Army and shortly after General
Monk being placed along we received informa-
tions that the British light horse were
advancing and a general order to retreat
from the main Army - so we then ran an
open field of fire and directly commenced
retreating forming until we joined it.
On joining the main Army, he, for the
first time, saw Baron Steuben their Trophy
who had a few days before that time
joined General and Major the 14th was in no
better during his short service but was
engaged in pursuing the British Army
some time following returning from the
in which service they declared Enlisted
much from fatigue, hunger & loss of
Sleep. Having served Three months, the
period for which he was drafted, he
was discharged from the Service with Recd.
no written discharge. He does not recollect
the day of the month when he entered the
service nor the day of the month when he
was discharged from it but he positively
declares & swears that he served Three
months. Again in the year 1782 in the
month of March or April or well as he
now recollects the Indians having broken
into the Frontiers of Virginia & killed some
families, the Inhabitants became very much
alarmed & called for a Guard and a draft
took place after declaration was drafted for
a term of Three months & put in the

Company commanded by Captain Bennett Leavengood
and marched out on the frontier to Tigray Valley,
about forty miles from his ~~Piedmont~~
in the mountains and located out in the
different stations. The duty of said Company by
was to go out in scouting parties from the
different stations and to guard and protect
the inhabitants which duty they discharged
performed for three months and at the
expiration of said term he was discharged
of all his pay and ~~his~~ ^{as a private} discharge may not be
written and at this day he cannot recall
the day of the month or date he entered the
service the last time or the day of the month
on which he was discharged from the service
or salary being paid him ^{as a private} monthly
monthly in the last service starting in
all in the years 1781 & 1782. The facts
of his service for which he
claims a pension. He has no documentary
evidence in his possession by which he
can prove his service as apportioned and he
knows of no person now living by whom he
can do so and there is no clayman in his
neighbourhood. He is at present unable to
procure the certificate of one who is able
to testify as required by the War Department.
I hereby release with every claim whatever to
a pension or annuity except the present
and declare that my name is put on the
Pension Roll of any agency of any State
To the Investigator directed by the War
Department to be proceeded by the Court
to the appointment he makes the following
Answers - To the 1st Interrogatory - He was
born on the 8th September 1763 in Mecklenburg
County State of Virginia
To the 2nd Interrogatory - He has the Record of

his age nearly knowing nothing from information
derived from his mother.

To the 3^d Interrogatory. The answer thereto is: He
was living in Hardy County State of Virginia
when Called into Service took the first of his
Tour of Duty and has not since the year
1784 when he removed to Kentucky then a
part of Virginia & settled in what was

Called Jefferson County & now is in Scott County
until Russell County was formed - in which
which time he has resided except weekly in
Russell County in the State of Kentucky.

To the 4th Interrogatory. He was discharged
for both Tours of Duty.

To the 5th Interrogatory. General La Fayette
Commanded the Troops where he first served.
He will recollect that General Muhlen-
berg, Lyman Clayborne, & Daniel Stoenberne
with their Troops composed a part of Gen.
La Fayette's army. Gen. Muhlenberg was
often in the Camps where this Declaration
was made - Major McPherson always camped
in advance of the Army and this Declaration
had no opportunity of becoming acquainted
but with many of the Officers & Gentlemen
who composed General La Fayette's Army
when he served the second tour of duty.
There were no regular Officers or Troops. There
was only one Company of Drafted Militia
under the command of Captain Daniel
Leavenworth. He has already, in the body
of this Declaration, detailed the General
circumstances of his service.

To the 6th Interrogatory. He never did
receive a written discharge.

To the 7th Interrogatory. He answers that
he is known to General Henry Cress, Jef-

"State of Kentucky Bullitt County Court October Term 1838
6th day of October 1838

This day Susan Hornbeck appeared in open Court being a
Court of record and being sworn deponys and says, that she is now
the widow of Samuel Hornbeck deceased, that she was married
to the said Hornbeck before the year 1791, and continued to
live with him in lawful matlock from the said year up
to his death, which took place on the 2^d day of June 1835.

That said Samuel Hornbeck was a pensioner of the United
States as a soldier of the Revolution, in the Kentucky Agency,
at the time of his death. A reference to the records in the
Department of War is made. She makes this declaration
in order to obtain the benefit of the acts of Congress granting
to the widows of Pensioners of the Revolutionary war, pension.
She has no record of her marriage - she has resided in
Kentucky ever since, and now resides in Bullitt County.

"John Hornbeck was sworn and states, that he is the
brother of Samuel Hornbeck deceased who was late a pensioner
of the U States in the Kentucky Agency: that Susan
Hornbeck whose declaration is above, is his widow; that he
knows that she was the wife of said Sam'l. Hornbeck deceased
in the year 1792 and that they continued to live as man &
wife up to the death of said Samuel Hornbeck which took
place on the 2^d June 1835." "which statement so made
to in open Court, being a Court of Record, the same is ordered
to be certified to the War Department: - And the Court
also certifies that it is satisfied that said John
Hornbeck is a credible witness."

Madam:

I advise you from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, W. 8950, it appears that Samuel Hornbeck was born September 8, 1782 in Hampshire County, Virginia.

While residing in Hardy County, Virginia, he served from in April 1781, three months as a private in Captain Michael Stump's Company under Major McPherson in the Virginia Troops.

He served from in March or April 1782, three months as a private under Captain Daniel Teavebaugh in the Virginia Troops, and guarded the frontier against the Indians.

He was allowed pension on his application executed July 15, 1833, while a resident of Bullitt County, Kentucky. He died June 3, 1835.

Soldier married January 24, 1793 in Bourbon County, Kentucky, Succannah or Susan Coffman. She was allowed pension on her application executed March 11, 1839, while a resident of Bullitt County, Kentucky, aged sixty-eight years.

There are no data on file relative to children.
