widow of Charles Langdale alias Langdale  
who was a Private of Cavalry P<sup>t</sup>A  
in the Revolution.

To the Honorable John C. Calhoun, Secretary of the  
Department of War of the United States.

I John Oldham ancient Judge of the First  
Judicial District of Kentucky, and sole Judge of the  
Bullitt County Court, in said District do certify  
that this day Charles Langsdon came personally  
before me, and declared under oath, That he is  
a citizen of the United States and a resident  
of Bullitt County appeared - That in the year 1775,  
or 1780 he enlisted in the Corps of Dragoons com-  
manded by Captain John White, in a Regiment com-  
manded by Col John White, or Continental establish-  
ment. That he served for some time in said  
White's Regiment, and was then transferred to  
Col Washington's Regiment of Dragoons; That after  
Col Washington was taken prisoner at Cuttaw Spring,  
the Regiment was commanded by Major Swan -  
That he served between three and four years.  
and until the end of the War in 1783. When  
all the Dragoons in said Regiment were permitted  
by Major Swan to go home, from Bladstone  
(O6) and were directed to apply at Richmond  
(Va) for their discharges; but that he never applied  
for his, and never obtained any discharge, & that  
none of the officers in said Regiment ever did  
so. That from his Return home to Kentucky he  
met the apothecaries of his County to support; and  
that he has never been allowed any money under  
the laws of the United States & given under my hand  
this 24<sup>th</sup> of September 1839. Jno D. Oldham

State of Kentucky Public Record

Charles Langdon a pensioner of the United States by  
Certificate dated the 6<sup>th</sup> day of May 1820 at Eight dollars  
per month came personally into this Court being a Court of  
Record and delivered a Schedule of his Service which the  
Court found at Ninety dollars and to whom the said  
~~Langdon~~ made oath agreeably to Law, I Oath upon it  
is found that the said Schedule and Oath be now read  
and verified to wit. State of Kentucky. On the 18<sup>th</sup> day  
of September 1820 personally appeared in Open Court before  
a Court of Record, for the County of Bell, by the sumon-  
ing and Statute Law of this State, Charles Langdon aged  
about fifty eight or fifty nine years residing in said County  
who being sworn according to Law doth on his oath  
declare that he served in the Revolutionary War as followg.  
He was enlisted by a Lieutenant Green at Hillsburg  
in North Carolina and sent to Halifax and was put in  
the Troop of Horse Commanded by Captain John Wall in  
the Regiment Commanded by

Colonel to which  
Regiment was Major all of the Virginia Line  
on Continental Establishment in the year 1780. From  
Halifax he was sent to Staunton in Virginia &  
afterwards was sent to South Carolina and placed in the  
Regiment Called Col. Washington's Regiment. He was at  
the Siege of York and then marched to North Carolina  
and served to the end of the War and was discharged  
at Murphy town. The number of his Pension is 10858  
and the date of his original application was on the  
24<sup>th</sup> day of September 1819. And I do solemnly swear  
that I was a Resident Citizen of the United States on  
the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818. And that I have not since  
that time by gift sale or in any manner disposed of  
my property or any part thereof with intent thereby  
to diminish it as to bring myself within the  
provisions of an Act of Congress entitled an act to

provide for certain persons engaged in the land and  
naval service of the United States. Dated on the 18<sup>th</sup>  
day of March 1818. And that I have not nor has  
any one in trust for me any property or security  
Contract or debt due to me nor have I any sum  
obtained toward what is contained in the schedule hereto  
annexed and by me subscribed. Right. One horse  
sixteen in fourteen years old, seven pounds weight  
and between fifteen & twenty three, one plough,  
two hoes, one axe, one bed, bedding furniture, six  
Common Chairs, six plates, six knives forks, 12 Pewter  
dishes & 2 bushels. The declarant is by occupation a  
farmer. His wife is aged about fifty eight years - she  
has been lame about thirty years, her health is not  
good. He has living with him two children a son  
& daughter. His daughter is about twenty three years old  
his son is sixteen, they are as healthy as ordinary  
persons. Known to declare the 18<sup>th</sup> day of  
September 1820 before the court aforesaid

"Elisabeth Banks. — To the Clerk of Prince Edward Court: —

"I know all men by these presents that we Charles Landale & Robert Hawkins of the County of Prince Edward, are held and firmly bound to his Excellency the governor of the State of Virginia in fifty pounds current money, to be paid to the said governor or his successor, to the which payment will and truly to be made, we bind ourselves and each of our heirs, executors or administrators jointly and severally firmly by these presents, sealed with our seals and dated this eighteenth day of December one thousand seven hundred and eighty eight. The condition of the above obligation is such, that whereas there is a marriage shortly intended to be solemnized between the above bound Charles Landale and Edith Banks (spinster) daughter of Richard Banks, that if there be no lawful cause to obstruct the said marriage then their obligation to be void, or else to remain in full force and virtue.

And I do hereby further certify that there is no register or certificate of marriage, filed in my office, solemnized between the said Charles Landale and Edith Banks, named in the above

State of Kentucky  
County of Jefferson  
Date 22nd 1880

On the second day of August 1857 personally appeared before me and signed a Declarant of the Name in and for said County Edw Langsdon a Resident of Jefferson County in the State of Kentucky aged twenty eight years on the 11<sup>th</sup> day of April 1837 (who being first duly sworn according to Law) doth on his Oath make the following Declaration in Order to obtain the benefits of the provisions made by the Act of Congress passed July 4 1836 that She is the widow of Charly Langsdon who was a Soldier of the Revolutionary Army with the Army Marching of the Service of said Langsdon and the boy No Recounting wherein she bears witness to having known him previous to his service. But She states that the said Charly Langsdon applied for a Pension under the Act of Congress of the 18<sup>th</sup> March 1818 and furnished the War Department with all the proof necessary to establish his claim on the Pension Roll of the United States which was so done in view of his service in the Army of the Revolution of the War Department of the United States to which she refers. on that Proof the said Charly Langsdon was placed on the pension list of the United States at the sum of Eight dollars per month during his Natural life as well as appear by the pension Certificate hereto attached dated the 6<sup>th</sup> day of May 1860 and signed by J. C. Calhoun Secretary of War. She further declares that she was married to the said Charly Langsdon in Prince Edward County State of Virginia on the 15<sup>th</sup> day of December 1818 after said Langsdon had quit the Army that they moved from Prince Edward County Va to Kentucky and settled in Marion County and lived there some years, then moved to Russell County Ky and lived there some years

Then passed to Jefferson County Kentucky, where  
the 10<sup>th</sup> day of October 1831 he died,  
on the 11<sup>th</sup> day of October 1831 and the testator  
recalled his widow in some that period  
not having been married again as will  
more fully appear by the testimony hereof  
deposited in this office. The only proof of the cause  
producit without great inconvenience, trouble  
expense and delay, the register of his marriage  
being at the time in Prince Edward County  
Virginia and she is too old now to procure  
a certified copy. The probate deposes that said  
Charly Langsdon was born as appears said to be  
leaving Little Langsdon (Residing in Bullitt County)  
July 18<sup>th</sup> 1810 married to Royal Langsdon, son of  
Langdon & William Langsdon (residing in Upper  
One County Ky) and Charly Langsdon (who resided  
in the State of Ohio or Michigan) by  
them that they were all over the age of twenty  
one years at the time of the death of said  
Charly Langsdon. That his wife after said  
her son to and settled on him his
