State of Kentucky
Bullitt County Esq. Supt.

On the fourth day of July one thousand eight hundred and twenty five personally appeared in open Court, being a Court of Record, Joseph Lloyd Esq. of the said County, aged sixty four years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration to run to obtain the provisions made by the acts of Congress of the 18th March 1818 and the 1st May 1820. That he the said Joseph Lloyd enlisted for the term of eighteen months say or about the 1st day of April 1781 in the state of Virginia in the Company commanded by Captain Samuel Miller in the 4th Virginia Regiment commanded by Colonel Thomas Hastings in the time of the State of Virginia or Continental Establishment. That he continued to have in said Corps or Company until he was sent home sick from York Town in Virginia that he continued sick until his term expired after which he obtained the Certificate of discharge of Brigadier General Morgan. That he thereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension except the present; that his name is not on the rolls of any state except Virginia and that the following are the reasons for not making earlier application for a pension vizt. He did not wish to be burdensome to his Country, did not wish to call on it for a support until increasing age & infirmities rendered it necessary. And in pursuance of the act of the 1st May 1820 I do solemnly swear that I am a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not given that value by gift sale or in any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof worth above thirty dollars to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an Act of Congress "entitled an Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War" passed on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not nor have any person in trust for

me any property or Security, Contracts or Debts due
to me nor have I any income other than what is
contained in the Schedule which annexed and by me

That since the 18th of March 1818 the following
changes have been made in my property fourth. I
owned no land even then or now. I have now more
Cattle & hogg than I then possessed. Moved to
Kosciusko in the year 1815 the expenses of which
nearly cost all my property and since the 18th
March 1818 I have increased my little property
to the above value of \$69. The declaration
further states that he is now old and not able
to do any labour; that he has for several
years past had no other means of supporting
himself and family but by keeping a small
Country School at low rates and from his age
and his increasing infirmities he is some time
unable to attend to attend to that business. He
has a wife who is about fifty five years old
and is unable to do much labour. She has
three daughters still living with him
whose ages are as following. Patty in her 22nd year
Alice in her 20th year, Lydia in her 13th year
John in his 18th year George in his 15th year.

Dear Sir:

The data which follow are obtained from the papers on file in Revolutionary War pension claim, S.36050, based upon the military service in that war of Joseph Lloyd.

The date and place of birth and the names of the parents of Joseph Lloyd are not shown.

Joseph Lloyd enlisted in Virginia, about April 1, 1781, served as sergeant under Captains Samuel Finley, James Grain and Kirkpatrick and Colonel Thomas Gaskins in the Virginia Troops; was at the siege of Yorktown, where he was taken sick and sent home and was not able again to rejoin his regiment.

In 1815, he moved to the state of Kentucky.

He was allowed pension on his application executed July 4, 1825, at which time he was aged sixty-four years and resided in Bullitt County, Kentucky.

On the above date, he stated that he was a school master and that his family then residing with him consisted of his wife, aged about fifty-five years, her name and date of their marriage not shown, and five children, three daughters and two sons as follows: Patty, Alsey and Lydia, aged respectively twenty-one, nineteen and twelve years; and John and George, aged respectively, seventeen and fifteen years.

Joseph Lloyd died May 11, 1848, place not shown.
